A decade ago, the Azrieli Foundation donated \$5 million to establish the Azrieli Institute of Israel Studies at Concordia. This helped inspire a bold new era of teaching and research for the benefit of all Canadians.

Isabelle Benoit Gelber

Fungi are an immense reservoir for new bioactive molecules such as enzymes and antibiotics and are also essential actors in our ecosystems. Isabelle Benoit Gelber's research combines fungal

biology, genomics and synthetic biology to solve problems in sectors of health, agriculture and forestry and energy. Benoit Gelber's role in the Canadian Fungal Research Network, launched in 2019, contributes to highlight the huge potential of fungal research. An assistant professor in Concordia's Department of Biology, Benoit Gelber is also affiliated with the Centre for Structural and Functional Genomics.

"As a molecular biologist, I participate in the multidisciplinary aspect of the institute. Our connection is a shared passion for academic excellence and for promoting bilateral collaborations between Israel and Canada; two countries with great opportunities for students to learn and grow."



Naftali Cohn

One of Naftali Cohn's passions is analyzing complex Jewish legal texts, such as the Mishnah. As chair of the Department of Religions and Cultures, he strives to make ancient texts relevant to current

societal issues. Such topics have included discussions about ritual, gender roles and inclusion. When he is not teaching, Cohn leads weekly Talmud classes for women, motivated by the belief that such study should be made available to all.



As senior lecturer of Arabic and coordinator of the Semitic Languages Program (Arabic and Hebrew) in the Department of Classics, Modern Languages and Linguistics Department at Concordia, El Hawari has over 25 years of experience in the field. From teaching in Alexandria, Egypt, to Middlebury, Vermont, her research focus is on language and identity, second-language acquisition and heritage-language education.



Shimon Amir

In addition to his courses in the Department of Psychology, Shimon Amir is a member of Concordia's renowned Centre for Studies in Behavioral Neurobiology. Through analyzing

circadian rhythms and the impact on stress, motivation and emotion, his research has important implications (and applications) for health. Amir is a graduate of Tel Aviv University and has also worked as an associate professor at Israel's Weizmann Institute of Science.

BEST BOOK IN ISRAEL STUDIES: MEET THE WINNERS




Two authors have captured the first annual award for the best book in Israel studies — a new prize jointly offered by the Azrieli Institute of Israel Studies and Concordia University Library.

A senior lecturer in modern art, architecture and visual culture at Sapir Academic College/Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, Gitler says she is honoured and excited to have received the award. "I believe such recognition is so important to promote Israel studies, and this is a chance to show my deepest appreciation for the Azrieli Institute and all its generosity."

Intoxicating Zion tells the story of how Palestine became the most important way station in the Middle Eastern hashish trade after European powers carved up the region's political boundaries in the aftermath of the First



World War. Colonial authorities failed to control this trade, which became a point of contention in the Arab-Israeli conflict in the 1960s.

Adds Geoffrey Little, MA 15, associate university librarian and director of Concordia University Press: "I think this is a great way for the library and the institute to participate in the promotion of new and exciting literature in Israel studies. The submissions represent a rich and diverse literature on these subjects."

The jury that awarded the prizes was composed of Nikolenyi, Little, Loren Lerner, professor emeritus, Department of Art History, and Ira Robinson, professor emeritus, Department of Religion and chair and director of the Concordia Institute for Canadian Jewish Studies.

TENYEARS: A LOOK BACK

They had to dream big.

In 2007 and 2008, three Concordia professors — Menachem Rotstein (classics and modern languages), Norma Joseph (religion) and Csaba Nikolenyi (political science) — shared a mutual interest in strengthening the study of Israel at the university.

Rotstein's long-standing concerns about maintaining and improving the teaching of Hebrew kick-started the discussions, which later prompted Joseph to contact Naomi Azrieli, daughter of steadfast Concordia supporter David Azriel and chair of the Azrieli Foundation.

Along with Simon Bensimon, then principal director of Development with the Faculty of Arts and Science, Joseph and Nikolenyi pitched the ambitious idea of a multidisciplinary research institute dedicated to the study of Israel.

The Foundation was enthusiastic and the announcement came in June 2011: it would donate \$5 million to establish the Azrieli Institute of Israel Studies at the Faculty of Arts and Science.

"We are delighted to support this important academic initiative," Naomi Azrieli said at the time. "We feel that the multidisciplinary approach — which goes well beyond politics to look at culture, society, history, economics, literature, language and much more — is particularly important." Over the ensuing decade, the institute has supported visiting professors, research funding, academic exchanges, new courses, the establishment of graduate fellowships, summer school programs in Israel and conferences and public events dedicated to promoting teaching, research and scholarship.

Nikolenyi, who has served as director since the institute's inception (and co-director with Joseph in the early years), says the first 10 years have seen significant accomplishments: expanding Israel studies at Concordia with, in 2013, the first-such minor program at a Canadian university; building important bridges between Montreal and Israel; and raising Concordia's international profile in the world of Israel studies.

"Our summer school participants are ambassadors of Montreal," Nikolenyi says of the student cohorts who have visited Israel since 2017. "In our meetings with Israeli students and social, political and cultural actors, our students become important carriers and conveyors of knowledge about Montreal, Quebec and Canada."

The summer program has also helped students enhance their understanding of Israel beyond what they could absorb in a classroom in Montreal.

"I had to set aside my personal identity, customs and beliefs and exercise an open mind and a willingness to see new people and places I would never be able to anywhere else in the world," wrote Sarah Conley, BA 19, MA, 21, in a 2017 testimonial. Observed Jonathan Penny, BA 21, in 2018: "The field trips were really integral to the learning experience. While the classroom provided a theoretical framework for understanding Israel's place in the Middle East, the field trips allowed us to see the reality of Israeli political existence and connect it to what was being talked about in class."

As for raising Concordia's profile internationally, Nikolenyi points to the institute's membership in the pre-eminent Association for Israel Studies (AIS): "We hosted the AIS annual meeting in 2015, drawing more than 300 participants from around the world."

This was a major achievement, adds Joseph: "One of the things Csaba has done is get Concordia recognized internationally. What he has done has been very, very important."


Rotstein also sees positives in the ways in which the institute has shone a light on "the many facets of Israel's leadership in so many areas," including culture and science and technology, and opened the door to students from diverse backgrounds.

"Every year, without fail, we have a significant number of Arab students taking Hebrew," he says. "You cannot have Israel studies if you don't have a grounding in Hebrew."

Looking ahead, Nikolenyi wants to "strengthen and diversify our curricular offerings through new and innovative courses" as well as develop online and blended courses that will allow students to spend more time in Israel.



As the institute embarks on its second decade, other goals include creating funding for a research chair, an Israel studies certificate, a film collection at Concordia University Library and a joint undergraduate program with one of the institute's Israeli partners.


culture of Israel, including our Streets of Israel project. With my passion for history, politics and culture, I'm grateful to have the opportunity to contribute to the Azrieli Institute.

It has been another successful year running the institute from behind our screens. Last year, we quickly pivoted and learned how to establish ourselves online, welcoming a geographically impressive spectrum of new viewers. Our aim this year was to implement new engaging initiatives for our participants,

readers and subscribers, and to broaden our reach online. The most popular one has been our monthly themed Instagram sessions dedicated to various Israeli topics and accomplishments. This initiative could not have been possible without the research and Instagram captions led by Layla Rudy, one of our 2021 research assistants. Her work has brought more life to our Instagram profile and visually demonstrates the diversity that is Israel!

We started with Israeli agriculture and sustainability, looked at Israeli history and then explored the Israeli mosaic. The fall 2021 term ended by looking forward to new developments related to Israel in space. We have many themes planned for the winter and summer 2022 terms, including Israeli art, universities, humour, fashion and kabbalah.

To match the posts, we host at least one themed event per month. We are proud to report we have hit triple digits in participant numbers. Having online events means people are not limited by distance, and we have had engaging discussions with listeners from all over the world.

Randy's Corner, another new initiative, includes pieces written by our feature writer and in-house editor, Randy Pinsky. These articles, infused with Randy's insights, are

event recaps from the previous month, highlighting main themes and provoking a rethinking of current issues. We place a preview of the article in our online monthly newsletters (which has just surpassed 1,000 subscribers) and link it to its own section on our site.

Between our events, announcements, awards, contests and world news, there is always so much happening at the Azrieli Institute. Therefore, we've added our Twitter feed to the homepage to showcase tweets in real time and seamlessly connect visitors to exciting updates.

Our efforts to broaden our reach online and increase event registration has been highly successful. In addition to our digitally circulated flyers, social media posts, Concordia calendar and monthly newsletters, we have been promoting our events through email blasts by H-Net. This is a vibrant online international organization of interdisciplinary scholars and teachers sharing resources, conferences, new research and opportunities online. We are also working with the Association for Israel Studies, an international scholarly society devoted to the academic and professional study of Israel. In order to gain greater outreach in the community, we post our events on Live, a new online hub for Jewish events in Montreal, and on the Montreal Jewish community calendar provided by Federation CJA.

It has been a very busy year with powerful keynote speakers and a new book award in collaboration with Concordia Library, not to mention celebrating our 10th anniversary. We look forward to continued success and innovative programming in 2022!

ISRAELI ART, POLITICS AND HISTORY, RELIGION AND CULTURE

While most research centres wait several years before even attempting guest presentations and projects, the Azrieli Institute has been ambitious since its start. Over the past decade, the institute has hosted an impressive lineup of keynote speakers and experts, launched book awards, coordinated conferences and featured student-faculty panels. And the pace did not stop with the global pandemic. In true Israeli style, the institute adapted, hosting events virtually to adjust to the new reality. Here are some highlights on the themes of Israeli art, politics and history, and religion and culture.

Israeli Art

Visitors to the Azrieli Institute are immediately struck by the majestic multimedia mosaic created in honour of Israel's 70th anniversary. As explained by artist and Azrieli alumna Noa Isabel: "It serves as a celebratory 'highlight reel' of some of the big moments and influential people, cultural creativity and political successes that have shaped the Israel of today."

With newspaper clippings and sketches portraying iconic moments, the creativity is emblematic of the Azrieli's approach to exploring Israel. Another predominant example of Israeli artwork has been the very successful and long-running Jerusalem Art History Journal (2014-19) led by Loren Lerner. An online compilation of impactful student essays and art, submissions cover the sacred to the political, the traditional to the innovative and reflect "the real-life diversity and complexity of one of the world's most multifaceted cities."

In literature, the institute was proud to feature acclaimed giants such as Meir Shalev on Two She-Bears (2017) and Benjamin Balint on Kafka's Last Trial: The Case of a Literary Legacy (2019). An exciting new venture is a partnership with McGill-Queen's University Press for an interdisciplinary series on Israel in honour of the institute's 10th anniversary.

Beyond books and art, participants have had the opportunity to hear unique perspectives on current themes, such as urban planner Karen Lee Bar-Sinai's talk on Designing Israeli-Palestinian Peace: the Role of Architecture in Conflict Resolution (2013). In 2014, visitors were moved by Francesco Lotoro's powerful performance of music composed in concentration camps, an inspiring commitment to preservation. That stirring event was held in collaboration with the Azrieli Foundation. That same year, participants were also enthralled by a breathtaking exhibit of aerial images taken by worldrenowned Israeli photographer Duby Tal in Hopping Around Israel in a Quick Flight.

From art and written expression to haunting music and dazzling photos, the Azrieli Institute continues in its mission to depict Israel in a diverse array of mediums.

Israeli Politics and History

For those with just a cursory understanding of the Middle East, phrases that come to mind are invariably "conflict" or "tension." Yet this discredits the true diversity of the situation. Through a variety of talks and publications, the Azrieli Institute aims to present the multifaceted reality.

Andrea Gondos, MA 05, PhD 13, also recently published Kabbalah in Print (Suny Press, 2020).

While ownership of natural resources can be an impasse to peace, Ziv Rubinovitz suggested it can also facilitate it in Crude Peace: The Role of Oil Trade in the Israeli-Egyptian Peace Negotiations (2015). Yossi Klein Halevi continued the theme of peaceful co-existence in Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor (Harper Collins, 2018), with Jonathan Ghariani exploring the recent normalization of relations with Morocco.

But one cannot move forward without learning from the past. Rachel Blumenthal recently presented the Right to Reparations for Holocaust Survivors (Lexington Books, 2021). Participants also had the unique opportunity to watch the restored Memories of the Eichmann Trial (2021) covering the hunt of one of the masterminds of the Holocaust.

In looking back, one must also look forward to new opportunities. Examples include fostering connections with India's only Israel studies program, and talks by Aidan Beatty on The Shared History of the Jews and the Irish (2016).

Religion and state often overlap in Israel, especially in the context of law.
