

Specialization in History (60 credits)

This program applies to all who entered the History Specialization **between Fall 2015 and Winter 2022 (inclusive)**. Anyone entering the History Specialization after that date will follow the new program (see the document "History Specialization 2022").

The History Specialization established in 2015 requires 60 credits, distributed in this way:

6 Credits	History Skills Workshop courses (HISW) – see note below	
6 Credits	History of Europe: chosen from HIST 202, 206, 207, 208, 211, 235	
6 Credits	History of Asia or Africa: chosen from HIST 242, 261, 262, 263, 264

3 Credits	Any 200-level HIST course	
27 Credits	300-level HIST courses	
6 Credits	HIST courses at the 300 <i>or</i> 400 level	

Note on HISW courses: Due to the program change coming into effect in Fall 2022, the History Department will no longer offer HISW courses. If you have not yet satisfied those requirements for your program, the following HIST courses can be used as substitutions.
