- ! Questions about the event itself.
- ! Questions about the importance of this and other events in the community.
- ! Questions about community action.

About the Event

1. When is the event normally held? (For example, the long weekend in August, first Friday of March, etc).
2. What is its duration? (For example, half-day, four days, etc).
3. What are the main activities? (For example, a parade, fireworks, etc)
4. What year did this event start?
5. Why did this event start in the first place?
6. Please provide a brief history of the event. Has the event gone through ups and downs over the years, particularly in the last 10 years? If so, explain why.
7. Describe the history of the event's leadership. Describe how long people generally stay involved in planning and working the event, any issues related to the turnover of volunteers and the recruitment or participation of new volunteers. (Note to interviewer: You should also prompt the interviewee with "Has the event been mostly the work of just a few individuals, or the work of many?" "Has the same organization or different organizations been responsible for the event over the years?")
8. Including yourself, about how many of the following types of people are involved in planning this event this year? (Identify all that apply)
 - a general citizens
 - b other volunteer groups
 - c businesses
 - d youth
 - e representatives of government agencies
 - f others (please specify)
9. Including yourself, about how many of the following types of people are involved in "working" (providing labour on the day of the activity) this event this year? (Identify all that apply)

26. Looking back at the last 30 years, what have been the long standing strengths of this community? Please explain. (For example, we always pull together in times of crises, good people always run for council, our business people support local clubs, etc).

27. Looking back at the last 30 years, what have been the long standing weaknesses of this community? Please explain. (For example, we never got the civic centre built, too many people have always shopped out of town, high school kids go to school in another community and don’t have any connection with this community)

28. To what extent does the younger generation (those under 30 years of age) have similar or different attitudes about this community than the older generation (those over 55 years of age) in this community? Is this a good thing or a bad thing? Why? Please provide examples of similar attitudes and different attitudes.
